Policy in action: Applying adolescent research to defend when the voting age should be

INTRO

- The aim of the current study was to assess student's perspectives on the inclusion of a paper in an adolescent development class devoted to using adolescent and developmental research to argue when the voting age should be.
- It was guide by the theory of constructivism, which posits learning occurs through integrating prior knowledge with new information, assimilating and accommodating this into new knowledge (Jones & Brader-Areje, 2002)
- Prior research suggests students appreciate seeing how research can influence public policy (Heise, 1992)

METHOD

- In Fall 2020, students in an undergraduate adolescent class completed a paper where they had to use at least three arguments to defend what they think the voting age should be based only on developmental research/content
- An anonymous survey was sent during the Fall 2020 semester to students in an undergraduate adolescent development course.
- It sought their perceived learning of the content via the paper.

Students perceive to have a better understanding of adolescent development and how research can inform policy by writing a paper arguing what the voting age should be **based** only on developmental research
