

What's a grandfamily?

• Is it a rare family form?

No - The percentage of the population 30 years and older living with grandchildren is around 4%

Does it have three generations?

Maybe, most common type studied is custodial or skippedgeneration.

• Does everyone live in the same house?

Maybe, but not necessarily.

Living arrangements


- Same House

 - Grandparent(s) and grandchildren
 - Multiple Generations
 - Grandparent(s), Parent(s) and Grandchildren
 - Different Houses
 - Often in close proximity
 - Grandparents provide extensive childcare duties



In the Context of COVID-19

- COVID-19 represents an acute case of cumulative vulnerabilities
- COVID-19 = financial risk + health risk
- Ripple effects
