

Next Generation of Family Science Leaders Put Their Learning to Work

NCFR awarded its Honors Student Recognition — which acknowledges recipients' outstanding academic performance, leadership, and service — to a record 81 undergraduate and graduate students who completed degree programs in 2018.

These stellar students have already advanced the impact of Family Science at their schools, in their communities, and beyond. Members Inform Understanding of Current Events

As social, economic, and political events affecting families unfolded in 2018, NCFR members' work was central to curating three new collections of research-based resources — as well as updating four existing collections — that created a better understanding of how families experience the impacts of these events. New collections addressed what Family Science research says about family separation; transgender individuals and families; and how to discuss racial discrimination in society.

Pioneering Academic Programs Advance Family Science in Academia

In 2018, academic programs at Kansas State University, Longwood University, and Indiana State University piloted NCFR's new Family Life Education assessment exam, developed to help programs evaluate how well they're



teaching the 10 Family Life Education content areas required for individuals to earn NCFR's Certified Family Life Educator (CFLE) credential.

The exam will help Family Science programs demonstrate and improve their effectiveness, and increase the value of Family Science and Family Life Education programs in academia.


