### Quick Steps to Get Started

### 1. Log in to the Conference Virtual Platform at <a href="https://bit.ly/ncfr2021app">bit.ly/ncfr2021app</a>

Our conference platform Whova is the entry point to accessing the Zoom links for sessions. You will also be able to view session details, find session recordings, and connect with other attendees.

- Use Whova on your computer's web app (Chrome is recommended) or download the app on your mobile device.
- To sign in, you will need to use the same email address you used when registering for the conference.
- Not sure which email address that is? Log in to my.ncfr.org and refer to the email address shown under the "My Profile" area.

### 2. Get the Latest Version of Zoom at https://zoom.us/download

All conference sessions will be in Zoom. Whova is the conference site itself and Zoom is the individual rooms where sessions take place.

- Go to Zoom's Help Center for the latest version of Zoom. This will ensure Zoom will work properly when you attend sessions.
- If you are a Facilitator, Moderator, Chair, Discussant, or Presider: Please be sure to arrive 15 minutes prior to your session in Zoom.

### 3. Browse and Search for Sessions You Want to Attend

Once in Whova, under the Agenda section you can search the full schedule and build your own personal agenda:

- Scroll through the days of the conference and select the date you want.
- Under Sessions, filter by tracks or search using a session name, presenter name, or other keyword.
- Search using a session name, presenter name, or other keyword.
- In the Speakers section, search for conference participants and see what sessions they are participating in.

Please note: The published conference schedule is in Central Time. When you log in to Whova, the schedule will automatically adjust times to your device's time zone.

### Guide for Using Whova, the Conference Platform

### Log in at https://whova.com/portal/ webapp/annua7\_202104 or bit.ly/ ncfr2021app

The Whova conference platform can be accessed on a computer's web app (Chrome is recommended) or mobile app. Click the above link to log in to the conference platform on any device.

#### On web or mobile app

- You will need to use the same email address\* you used when registering for the conference.
- Click "Sign up here" if you don't already have a Whova account and fill in your email and password.

 Edit your profile to your liking, making sure to enter in your full name, as you would like it to appear to other conference attendees. This is how you will network and interact with others and exhibitors.

\*Not sure which email address that is? Log in to my.ncfr.org and refer to the email address shown under the "My Profile" area.

Once logged in, you will be able to access all features of the conference platform including:

- A full, searchable conference agenda
- The ability to create your own conference schedule
- Search for conference participants and attendees

### Viewing the Conference Schedule

All conference sessions will utilize Zoom Video Conferencing, accessible through Whova

The published conference schedule is in Central Time. When you log in to Whova, the schedule will automatically adjust times to your device's time zone.

- Find the "Agenda" tab (left side on web app, bottom on mobile app). Search for Whova in your app store or go to bit.ly/ ncfr2021app
- You can scroll through different days by selecting the date you want to view on the calendar at the top of the agenda. Click the arrow to the right for future dates and the left arrow for previous dates.
- 3. Browse or search for sessions on the top bar.
- 4. Filter by tracks (e.g., sections, type of sessions, and special interest areas)
- 5. Once you find the session you want to access, tap on it.
- If the session is live, it will begin playing immediately upon entering. Otherwise, scheduled start date and time is provided.
- If the session hasn't occurred yet, you can click Add to My Agenda to put the session on your own personal agenda and set a reminder.

### **Watching Conference Sessions**

All conference sessions will occur through Zoom. The link to each Zoom meeting can be found in the session on the conference platform.

Following a live stream session, the recordings will be available to registered conference attendees within 48 hours of the session's conclusion and accessible for 12 months.

#### On web app

- From the agenda list, click the session you want to watch. There will be either a button for live stream or recorded video.
- If the streaming screen directly shows up, click "Proceed" to start watching the stream. Otherwise click "View livestream" button to open a separate streaming page to watch.

### On mobile app

 On the mobile app, you can watch videos and livestreams directly through the agenda item.  Once you've accessed the agenda item, click on one of the options beneath Virtual Access: either Live Stream or Recorded video.

### **Watching Conference Sessions**

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### **Using Session Q&A in Whova**

There will be opportunities for Q&A through Zoom during sessions. Each session facilitator will provide instructions on how to ask questions inside Zoom.

In addition, each session has a Q&A attached to it in Whova for asynchronous conversations with presenters outside of the live session time.

### On web app

- Option 1: You can access three tabs on the right hand of the virtual session: Session Q&A, Chat, and Community. You can submit questions for the presenter through Session Q&A, participate in ongoing discussions with the other attendees viewing the session through Chat, and browse the Community Board function through Community
- Option 2: You can use the "Session Q&A" tab on the left-hand sidebar underneath Resources as an additional method for discussion.

#### On mobile app

- Option 1: On the session detail page, tap the "Q&A" button; on the next page, view the existing questions, vote on the questions you are interested in, or click "Ask a Question" to ask a new one.
- Option 2: On the event main page, tap "Session Q&A" button; find the session you want to ask questions in, and tap on it.

### Network and Chat with Conference Attendees

#### On web app

- Click the "Attendees" tab on the left side of the screen under Main Navigation.
- At the top of the page, you can search attendees by their name and keywords such as company name or title.
- 3. To start a conversation, click "Say Hi!" to begin a chat.

### On mobile app

- Click the "Attendees" tab (left side on web app, bottom on mobile app) to browse the attendee list.
- 2. At the top of the page, you can search attendees by their name and keywords such as company name or title. In their professional profiles, you can take notes or exchange ontact information.
- 3. To find people with common backgrounds and interests, click the "Recommended" tab on the top of the Attendees list to find Whova's recommendations about people with whom you may be interested in networking. Click into each item to see attendees who come from the same city or have the same affiliations, educational background, or interests as you.
- Say Hi with one click or start a private chat by clicking the Message button. You can convert it to a private group chat by inviting more people.

### Socialize Through the Community Board

The community feature allows you to start or join existing conversations with fellow attendees or to organize a meet up with specific colleagues. Reconnect with your old friends or make new ones!

 To get started, click the "Community" tab (left side on web app, bottom on mobile app)

- Create a new conversation topic or tap the topic to join existing topics like "Meet-ups."
- Click Follow directly next to the topics on the Community Board with which you want to stay up to date. To find the topics you're following, choose between three tabs near the top of the page: All Topics, Followed, and New Topics.

### Join a Meet-up on web app

- Go to the Community Board and find the board for Meet-ups and Virtual Meets.
- Find the meetup you are interested in, join directly, or click into it to see more details, and then click "RSVP"
- 3. When the meetup starts, click "Join meeting room" to start chatting!
- 4. There is an RSVP button for meet ups already scheduled.

### Join a Meet-up on mobile app

- 1. Go to the Community Board and find the board for Meet-ups and Virtual Meets.
- 2. Find the Meet-up you are interested in, join directly, or tap into it to see more details, and then tap "Join."

You can also suggest a new meetup by tapping "Suggest a Meet" and inputting the details. If you know someone will be interested, invite them to participate as well. If you have a meeting link, you can copypaste there. Otherwise you can use Whova's virtual meet room, which allows up to 30 participants.

### **Attending Receptions**

Invited guests for our different receptions will be emailed a link to either the Zoom meeting or agenda item in Whova, such as the Newcomers Welcome, CFLE Reception, University Receptions, and Legacy Circle.

All registered attendees are welcome to attend the President's Reception and University Reception.

- 1. To attend, find the "Agenda" tab (left side on web app, bottom on mobile app) and search for the reception.
- Receptions will have a single Zoom link to click and join the reception. Make sure you have the latest version of Zoom installed on your device.

- The University Receptions and Newcomers Reception will both begin a main room before using breakout rooms. Instructions will be provided during the session.
- You can also participate in these sessions through the Chat and Community features in Whova.

### Continuing Education (CE)

Verification of attendance for each session is required in order to earn CE credit hours. Only sessions identified as approved qualify for CE credit hours. Organizational approval and CE credit hours for each session are indicated on the CE verification form.

- NBCC CE Verification: NCFR is an approved provider of continuing education for NBCC, the National Board for Certified Counselors. The 2021 NCFR Conference is approved for 76 NBCC credit hours.
  - Most U.S. states accept NBCC credit for licensure requirements for marriage and family therapists. For information on specific state requirements, please consult your state's licensing board.
- Conference Attendance Verification (for any attendee, including CFLEs): The 2021 NCFR Conference is approved for 106 hours for Conference Attendance Verification.

This option is available to Certified Family Life Educators (CFLEs) if desired for their own records; NCFR does not require CFLEs to submit CE verification.

If you registered for NBCC CE or verification of conference attendance, you will submit verification of your session attendance via an online webform. You will receive an email shortly before the conference with the link to the verification webform with instructions about how and when to complete the form.

### Automatic Captioning through Zoom

Although we don't have live, on-screen captioning at all sessions, Zoom provides an automatic software-generated captioning feature during a session. At the bottom of the Zoom screen, you'll see the following options: Show Subtitle, Close Full Transcript (if you have it open) and Subtitle Settings.

- Clicking Show Subtitles will show you the conversation as it is happening.
- Clicking the Full Transcript option will open a panel to the right of the video with the transcript of the conversation.
- Clicking Subtitle Settings allows you to customize how you see the subtitles.

Because it is auto-generated, this captioning may not be 100% accurate.

### Conference Code of Conduct

### NCFR is committed to providing ...

- A safe and collegial meeting environment that fosters open dialogue and the free expression of ideas without harassment, discrimination, or hostile conduct.
- · Equal opportunity and treatment for all participants, regardless of ability and disability; age; bilingualism and multiculturalism/English language learners; body size and condition; customs and traditions; educational, disciplinary, or career status; ethnicity, race, national origin, or cultural identity; gender, gender identity, and gender expression; geographical background and location; indigenous or immigration status or identity; marital status, relational status (including singlehood), and family structure or identity; objective and subjective worldviews and standpoints; political ideologies and affiliations; religion/no religion, spirituality and affiliations, and faith; sexual orientation, identities, and expressions; or socioeconomic status, residential status, social class, employment, and national service.

This same commitment is expected of all participants in the NCFR Annual Conference. "Participant" refers to anyone present at the NCFR Annual Conference, including NCFR staff, contractors, vendors, exhibitors, venue staff, presenters, visitors, and attendees, regardless of registration status.

### All participants are expected to treat others with respect and consideration. Unacceptable behaviors include:

- abusive, demeaning, discriminatory, bullying, harassing behavior and speech, or harmful criticism.
- disruption of sessions or other events.
- intimidation or implied threat of physical harm or professional damage.
- harassment–sexual or otherwise–or any attention or contact considered unwelcome or offensive.
- harmful or prejudicial comments (spoken or written) or images related to race, gender, sexual orientation, ability, religion, or personal characteristics.

behaviors: Threatening behaviors, harassment, bullying, intimidation, threats to personal security (e.g., witnessed or experienced), or other unacceptable behaviors noted in this policy, during an NCFR event should be reported. NCFR Staff or an NCFR Board Member who may be reached through emailing conduct@ncfr. org. All incidents should be reported and

documented by completing an *Incident Report for Violations of NCFR's Code of Conduct.* All complaints will be treated seriously and responded to promptly.

Participants who engage in unacceptable behaviors are subject to immediate removal from the event, dismissal from the conference, and further sanctions, including being prohibited from attending future conferences.

#### Social media and e-communications:

Defamatory, abusive, profane, threatening, or offensive comments or posts are considered unacceptable and can result in denial of access and further sanctions as described above.

#### Written reports

Any participant who is subjected to or witnesses an incident of harassment or abusive behavior may file a written report. Reports should include identification of the offender (or description); behaviors or actions by that person; circumstances around the incident; day, time, event name; and others present. All written reports are kept confidential to the extent possible. These details are necessary to allow for proper follow-up. Without proper details, it may not be possible to follow-up on the report. NCFR will review all written reports and, if it deems it appropriate, conduct an investigation.

### Grievances

A participant who believes they were falsely or unfairly accused of violating this Code of Conduct should immediately notify the NCFR executive director with a concise description of the grievance. All grievances will be handled in accordance with existing governing policies as adopted by the Board of Directors.



#### **Summary**

### Sustainable Conference Goals

This evidence-based presentation will (a) strengthen research on race, culture, and families; (b) enhance the work of scholars, educators, practitioners, and policymakers; and (c) provide a critical framework for scholars focused on the design, modification, and evaluations of curriculum and courses.

### **Objectives**

- To recognize the intellectual traditions and paradigmatic tensions in the discipline of Family Science rooted in hegemonic discourse(s) about race, family, and gender.
- To engage in critical reflections about the political and sociohistorical context in which knowledgegeneration occurs and is validated, and in whose interests.
- To deconstruct how race and the subfields of Black family and developmental studies influenced the discipline of Family Science.
- To recognize the critical role of Black scholars, and the paradigmatic rifts they created alongside the 100-plus year history of Family Science.
- To integrate into the canon of Family Science the history of Black family and developmental studies, and their impact on theoretical and methodological advancements of the discipline.

#### **About the Presenter**

Andrea Hunter, Ph.D., is a professor in the Department of Human Development and Family Studies and a Chancellor's Fellow for Campus Climate at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro. She received her doctorate from Cornell University in human development and family studies. Dr. Hunter's research focuses on African American families and tackles questions central to public debates about the functioning of these families. These include the study of gender constructions and relations, family structure, social capital/networks, extended families, and family history.

She is also the director of the Research Training Core for the Health Disparities Research Center of Excellence at Meharry. Dr. Matthews-Juarez participates with transdisciplinary and translational teams of scientists interested in exploring the role of epigenetics in chronic diseases and health disparities. Additionally, she works with community organizations and agencies to bring about social equity around social determinants of health. Recently, her research work has been focused on the inclusion of vulnerable populations (LBGTQ, persons experiencing homelessness, and migrant farm workers) in the training of medical students.

### **Summary**

Based on a community-based participatory approach, we developed a culturally-responsive needs and assets assessment to address issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic in six Black communities across the United States. An online survey and secondary sources were used to collect data on health, mental health, well-being, coping strategies, family and child life changes, race-related factors, COVID-19 behaviors, and social determinants of health. Social determinants included children experiencing social isolation due to online instruction, cultural mistrust, the intersection of COVID-19 with racial injustices, living in disasterprone areas, food insecurity, and preexisting health conditions that compounded developmental pathways of participants. Findings from the Association of Black Psychologists (ABPsi) COVID-19 Needs Assessment Project will serve as a centering point with plenary presenters linking similar and dissimilar findings from other studies. The session closes with best practices for culturally accountable mental health strategies and recommendations that could support the acquisition and maintenance of hope, health, and happiness in the face of ongoing layers of daily living, posttraumatic slave distress, historical trauma, survivor's quilt, and the COVID-19 pandemic.

### Sustainable Goals

The current session includes innovations in community-based and culturally aware approaches to translational science. Participants will also learn ways to apply lessons learned and findings to inform policies and programs that support persons from diverse locations to manifest a sense of hope, happiness, and health in the face of COVID-19, racial discrimination, environmental, historical, and other factors.

### **Objectives**

Participants of the special session will be able to:

- identify a strengths-based, community-oriented model to address issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic in Black communities.
- critique the multidimensional risk and protective factors (e.g., economic, continuum of coping strategies, personal and environmental factors, religious practices, and other positive coping strategies, etc.) that shape Black individuals' and families' capacity to remain healthy, happy, and hopeful during the COVID-19 pandemic.
- describe culturally responsive approaches to examine the intersection of race, ethnicity, culture, historical, and mental health during COVID-19.

#### **About the Presenter**

Suzanne Randolph Cunningham, Ph.D., is chief science officer, senior research scientist, and director of continuing education of MayaTech, an applied public health research firm. She served as senior researcher for the Association of Black Psychologists (ABPsi) COVID-19 Needs Assessment Project. She is also associate professor emerita of Family Science at the University of Maryland School of Public Health. Dr. Randolph Cunningham has over 35 years of methodological expertise in survey, experimental, and evaluation research designs applied to the study of social and human services, and public health programs and policies

### Summary

Racism is a huge roadblock to achieving health and social equity in the United States, yet many people are in staunch denial of its continued existence and profoundly negative impacts on the health and well-being of the nation. And even those who acknowledge that racism exists sometimes feel ill-equipped to say the word "racism" out loud or take action to address it.

Dr. Jones will share four of her allegories on "race" and racism to illuminate four key messages: (1) Racism exists | Dual Reality: A Restaurant Saga; (2) Racism is a system | Cement Dust in Our Lungs; (3) Racism saps the strength of the whole society | Levels of Racism: A Gardener's Tale; (4) We can act to dismantle racism | Life on a Conveyor Belt: Moving to Action

She will also provide definitions and action frameworks to equip participants to engage in a sustained National Campaign Against Racism.

She earned her B.A. in Molecular Biology from Wellesley College, her M.D. from the Stanford University School of Medicine, and both her Master of Public Health and her Ph.D. in epidemiology from the Johns Hopkins School of Hygiene and Public Health. She also completed residency training in general preventive medicine at Johns Hopkins and in family practice at the residency program in social medicine at Montefiore Medical Center.

Plenary presenter **Yasser Payne**, **Ph.D.**, associate professor in sociology and criminal justice from the University of Delaware, will highlight a street ethnographic research program centered on exploring notions of resilience and resiliency in street identified Black and Brown populations that are typically "unseen."

Another art principle that can be applied to Family Science and families is the concept of values. "Values are the different shades of gray between white and black; [they] translate the light and shadows" into shading, thus creating "the illusion of a third dimension" (Visual Arts, 2012). What role do our values play in research, practice, theorizing, policy, and teaching? How do Family Scientists decide what to value? What new dimensions of families are revealed by a shift in light, perspective, or values and what are the challenges of examining values? Our plenary presenter, **Deadric Williams, Ph.D.**, assistant professor of sociology from the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, will explore how values have impacted our Family Science research and practice by applying the lens of critical race theory to past and contemporary Family Science research.

Hatching and crosshatching are artistic techniques used to create shading effects in two-dimensional media. Family Scientists can influence other's perspectives on families by changing how they (families) are shaded. Turner and West (2018, p. 90) argue we need to "become ever more mindful of the wide variety of families existing in contemporary society whose voices need to be heard."

Plenary presenter, **Kao Kalia Yang**, and author of the memoirs *The Latehomecomer: A Hmong Family Memoir, The Song Poet*, and *Somewhere in the Unknown World* as well as the children's books *A Map Into the World, The Shared Room, The Most Beautiful Thing*, and *Yang Warriors* will bring light to stories of those often unnamed and in shadow.

"Before you can draw the light and shadows you see, you need to train your eyes to see like an artist" (Anonymous, 2019). Have Family Scientists been trained as artists? What different ways could we study a phenomenon? Teach about families? Create or assess family policies? How do our best practices intersect with light and shadow? Do they address multiple dimensions? Plenary presenter **Derek Peterson** uses a multidimensional, multi-theoretical approach in his Integrative Youth Development framework. Why do some teens come through these tough years seemingly unscathed while others constantly struggle or don't make it through at all? How can a thick and vibrant Full Color Web of Support™ (see brightwayslearning.org/kaleidoscope-connect) promote thriving?

As you can see, Family Science is akin to art; we "enter it from a variety of angles and emerge with a variety of views" (Smich, n.d.). I hope you enjoy the experience!

- (a) The work is sufficiently developed.
- (b) Regardless of focus (e.g., research, practice), an appropriate, rigorous approach is used.

The proposal is written clearly, logically organized, and includes references.

Proposals can be based on qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods; literature reviews; or analyses of a theoretical, pedagogical, or policy nature, and must include:

- (a) A strong connection to existing research
- (b) A strong connection to theory
- (c) The potential to stimulate new knowledge and or innovative practices

### **Submission Questions**

### May I submit a previously published/presented paper?

No. Papers that have been published or previously presented are not accepted.

When will I know if my proposal has been accepted? You will be notified by June 1, 2022.

### If my proposal is accepted, what is expected of me?

At least one author of accepted proposals must attend the conference, register, and pay the registration fee to present.

Upload copies of the PowerPoint slides you will be using to the NCFR website by one week prior to the conference. A virtual conference may require alternative documents to be uploaded sooner than one week prior to the conference.

If your presentation is accepted as a paper, symposium, lightning paper, or poster symposium, a copy of your presentation must be sent to the session facilitator/discussant by Oct. 26, 2022. You also are required to upload your presentation PowerPoint slides to the NCFR website (except poster symposium).

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
