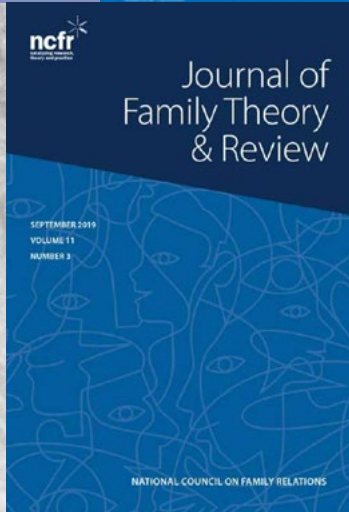
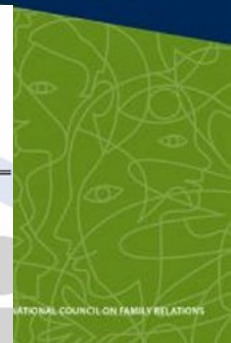
Welcome to the 2023 National Council on Family Relations Annual Conference! This year's theme, "The Way We Are Now: Families and Communities at the Center of the Syndemic," challenges us to critically investigate and call attention to the ways that the current social, cultural, political, environmental, and health landscapes are changing and how those changes impact families and communities in the US and around the world.

The term syndemic is meant to capture the swirl and chaos of multiple pandemics - those related to health but also those related to social change. In addition to the COVID-19 pandemic, communities and nations are also struggling with a variety of social injustices (e.g., racism, gun violence, homophobia, climate change). Together these constitute a syndemic. Syndemic theory, which has evolved out of medical anthropology, draws our attention to the many public health and societal influences on human life that cause multiple layers of harm. As Family Scientists and practitioners, we have much work to do to understand how a syndemic impacts individuals, families, and communities so that we can develop various methods to help best navigate the syndemic and promote health and well-being. The syndemic has made many societal issues more visible including existing and new health disparities, the profound loss that affects communities in diverse ways, and policies that actively disenfranchise so many. We are experiencing a historically significant moment in history that has already distinctly influenced families and communities.

As conference attendees and NCFR members, we would be remiss not to consider what the location of our meeting means to both conference attendees and the families we serve. Florida has been the epicenter for many aspects of the syndemic we are experiencing and the situation seems to change almost daily. As a result, it is not surprising that, for some, attending the conference in person in Florida is not possible. I am grateful to the NCFR Board and staff who have helped to make the opportunity for remote and virtual participation possible for our members, despite the huge financial and logistical costs. I know the NCFR staff has worked tirelessly to enact the Board's directive to create as interactive in-person and virtual experiences as possible. I am also grateful for our colleagues at the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign who are hosting our members so that they can gather together and participate in the conference as a community.

My hope is that our keynote speakers, special sessions, and presentations throughout this conference will create space for our members to engage in dialogue so that we can listen to and learn from one another, find small places of healing where possible, develop the resolve to forge our way forward, and gain insights about how we can support families and communities in the coming future. Conference Registration and Badges

Anyone attending NCFR conference events — including visitors — must be registered and wear a badge at all times while attending conference activities. Your registration fee covers attendance at:

Our Current Crisis in Historical Perspective

Stephanie Coontz, M.A., (she/her) is the director of research and public education at the Council on Contemporary Families, and professor emerita at Evergreen State College.

As highlighted by the 2023 NCFR conference theme, society is experiencing a syndemic period brought about by the COVID-19 pandemic. This talk will attempt to connect the converging crises of the 21st century and the diverging responses to those crises into historical perspective. Contradictions and trade-offs produced by changing socioeconomic relationships and changing values about gender, race, class, and equality will be emphasized. Suggestions will be provided as to what we can learn from history – and from on-going research – about what we can and cannot do to contain or cure the social and personal pathologies of this syndemic.

Ambiguity, Compounded Loss, and Suffocated Grief in Families Amid the Syndemic

Tashel C. Bordere, Ph.D., CT, (she/her) is a certified thanatologist, grant-funded researcher at the Center for Family Policy and Research and adjunct faculty, Department of Human Development and Family Science, at the University of Missouri-Columbia.

In a largely death-denying, grief-blind broader culture, social media and national movements have been pivotal in bringing widespread attention to the hidden traumas, complex losses, and profound grief of families simultaneously coping with the Covid-19 pandemic, social unrest, and sociopolitical grief. This plenary will address ways that historical patterns of ambiguous, compounded loss, disenfranchisement, and suffocated grief (or penalties assessed of grieving individuals) were further exacerbated by the Covid-19 pandemic and systemic inequities. Drawing from social justice-based grief theories, research, and case examples, we will examine social justice issues in loss in the syndemic, centering families located at the margins, opportunities for dismantling systemic impediments to coping, and ways to promote grief enfranchisement in various institutions. Implications for grief-informed research, education, clinical practice, programming and policy will be addressed.

The Impact of Discriminatory and Affirming Laws and Policies on LGBTQ Parent Families

Abbie E. Goldberg, Ph.D.

Abbie E. Goldberg, Ph.D., (she/her) is a professor in the Dept. of Psychology, and director of Women's and Gender Studies, Clark University

LGBTQ parent families are currently being impacted by laws and policies across the U.S. that directly or indirectly stigmatize LGBTQ identities, as well by the sociopolitical climate that often accompanies or embeds such laws and policies. This plenary will address how laws and policies that recognize (versus deny the existence of) same-sex relationships and LGBTQ parent-child relationships serve to impact the lives and well-being of LGBTQ parents and their families. It will also address how laws and policies that restrict recognition, affirmation, or inclusion of LGBTQ identities—such as in schools—impact LGBTQ parents and their children. Attention will be paid to the role of sociopolitical context and community climate in understanding sources of pain, tension, and resilience for LGBTQ parent families. This presentation will include data collected from three recent studies that examine the impact of the Parental Rights in Education Act (Don't Say Gay) in Florida. It will also address contemporary challenges—legal and institutional—to conducting this type of research in the current sociopolitical climate.

Marlene F. Watson, Ph.D., (she/her) is the director of training at the Ackerman Institute for the Family, and associate professor emerita and

former chair of the Couple and Family Therapy Department at Drexel University.

The American racial hierarchy played a critical role in the COVID-19 pandemic. Systemic racism, the child of the American racial hierarchy, adversely interacted with the COVID-19 pandemic to form a syndemic. Racism was known to be a social determinant of health prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. Systemic racism has impacted Black people across many generations, contributing to and maintaining an excess burden of disease for Black families. The COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated that a nation is not only as healthy as its people but that a more just nation is a healthier one. This plenary will explore the American racial hierarchy, systemic racism, and health inequity. It is also a call to action for family therapists, educators, researchers, and policymakers to collectively take on systemic racism and promote mental and physical health equity.

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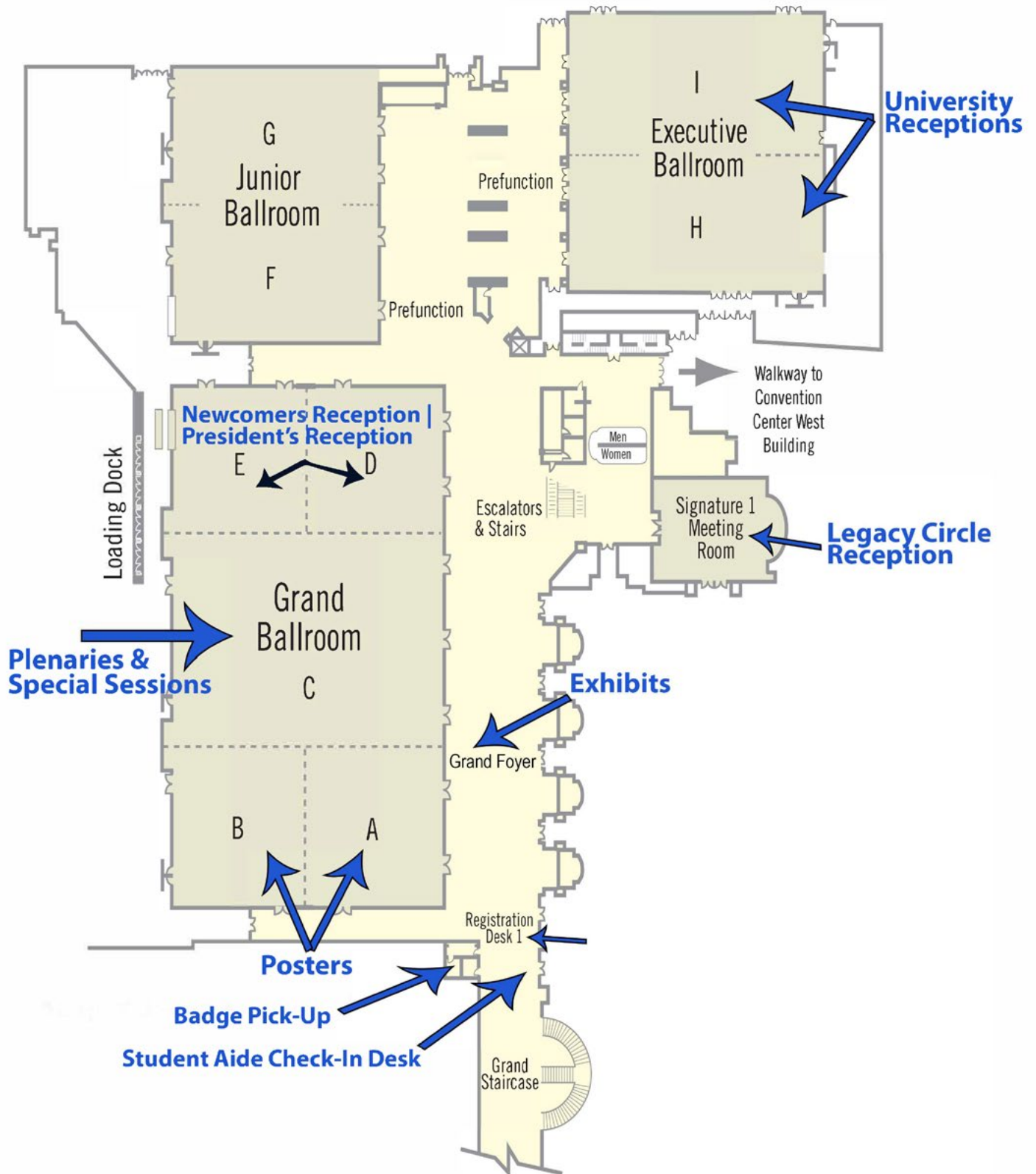
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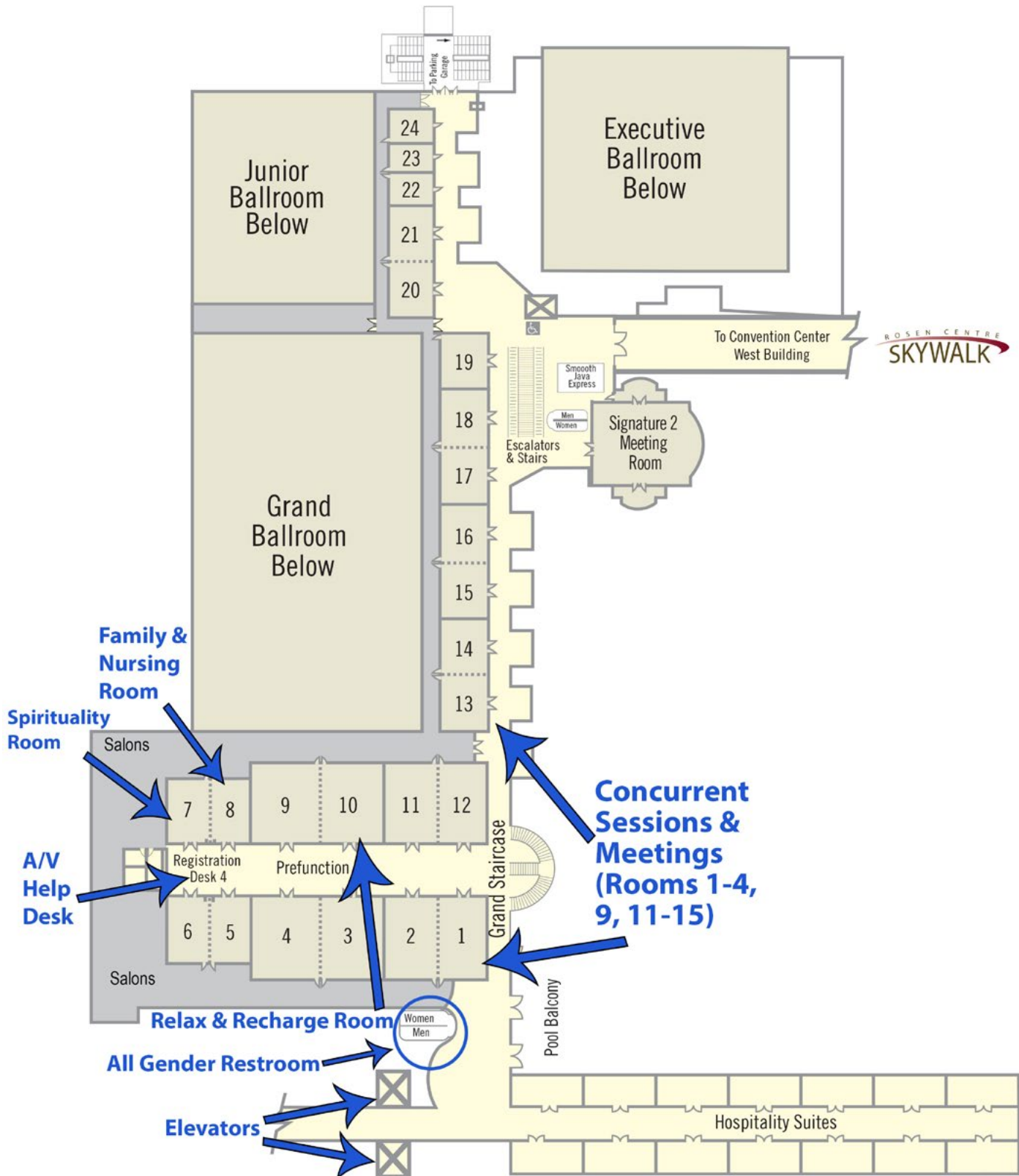
Hotel Map

JESSIE BERNARD OUTSTANDING CONTRIBUTION TO FEMINIST SCHOLARSHIP PAPER

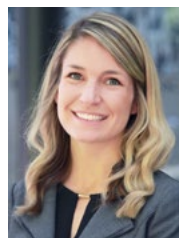
Mia Brantley, Ph.D. Caroline Sanner, Ph.D.

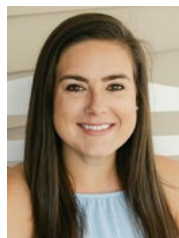

CINDY WINTER SCHOLARSHIP

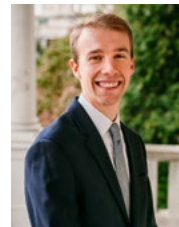


Haley Sherman, M.S., CFLE

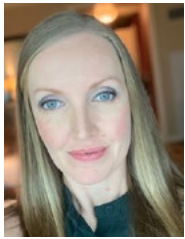
Named in memory of Reuben Hill, distinguished professor and pioneer of the scholarly study of family. Awarded to the author(s) of an outstanding article or book that combines theory and methodology to analyze and interpret a significant family issue.

Dr. Galovan (he/him) is associate professor of human ecology at the University of Alberta. In the article, "A Strong Relationality View of Mindfulness and Flourishing—Thou Relations: A Dyadic Analysis," he outlined a strongly relational theoretical perspective, putting forward a comprehensive model of flourishing couple relationships. Dr. Galovan advocates that researchers employ rigorous and sophisticated research design and methodology in studying families.

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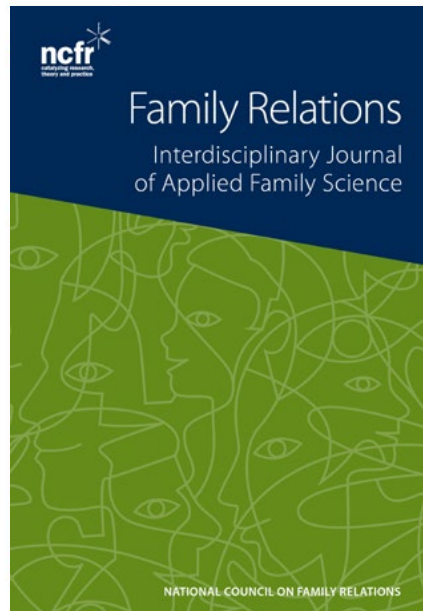
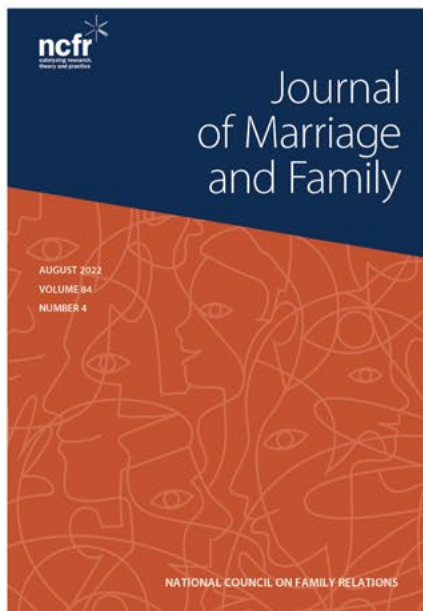
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2024 Conference Theme

The goal for the 2024 NCFR Annual Conference is for it to be a national model for building resilience and unity following heightened societal strain, division, and political tension that accompanied the global pandemic. The pandemic has been linked to myriad consequences for children and families such as increased economic strain and food insecurity; increased depression and suicide ideation; increased substance abuse and drug overdose deaths; and increased violence. Moreover, existing disparities in areas including education and wealth, family formation, and health and life expectancy widened during the pandemic. The long-term impacts of the pandemic on physical health, mental health,

educational attainment, family formation, and so forth are not yet fully known, and families and communities with historical disadvantages might be particularly at risk for long lasting and severe implications. The long-term impacts of the pandemic might have profound consequences that will shape generations.

NCFR is **the** national professional organization that contains top researchers and practitioners with the expertise needed to address these multifaceted adversities and to help foster resilience among families and communities. - (b) Regardless of focus (e.g., research, practice), an appropriate, rigorous approach is used.

The proposal is written clearly, logically organized, and includes references.

Proposals can be based on qualitative, quantitative, or mixed methods; literature reviews; or analyses of a theoretical, pedagogical, or policy nature, and must include:

- (a) A strong connection to existing research
- (b) A strong connection to theory
- (c) The potential to stimulate new knowledge and or innovative practices

Submission Questions

May I submit a previously published/presented paper?

No. Papers that have been published or previously presented are not accepted.

When will I know if my proposal has been accepted?

You will be notified by June 1, 2024.

If my proposal is accepted, what is expected of me?

At least one author of accepted proposals must attend the conference, register, and pay the registration fee to present.

Upload your PowerPoint slides being used during your presentation before the conference begins.

If your presentation is accepted as a paper, symposium, or lightning paper, a copy of your presentation must be sent to the session facilitator/discussant by Oct. 28, 2024.

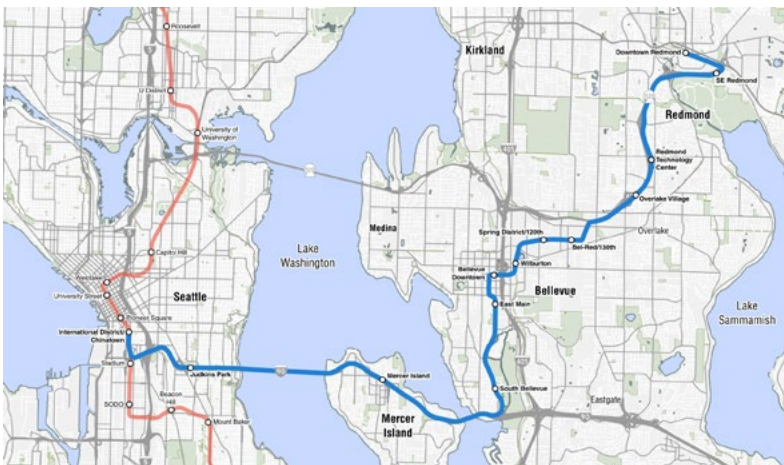
